



- Many knowledgeable baseball people believed the league was somewhere between Class A and Triple A. Viz
- "Equal to Class B ball" Minot manager Lefty Lefebvre, 1950. Dominion ball points out that, when Lefebvre gave the assessment, he hadn't yet seen the Winnipeg Buffaloes, who featured future Hall of Famers Leon Day and Willie Wells and who would later win the first ManDak championship.
- Class A? Upgrading Lefebrve's evaluation in light of above.
- "Between Class A and Class B"-Minot manager Otto Huber, 1951.
- Quad-A/PCL Open-Al Lyons, 1957.


Synthesis

- In 1950, Organized Baseball was divided into six levels of affiliated minor leagues, from Class AAA at the top to Class D at the bottom.
- In 1952, a new classification was created when the Pacific Coast League moved up to the "Open" Classification, making seven strata of professional ball below the exalted major leagues.
- In 1963, after a decade of disastrous decline, the minor leagues were reorganized and all Class B, C, and D leagues were elevated what is now a three-tiered Class A.
- Discounting Lyon's apparent hyperbole about a league that was on its deathbed, Class A seems like a good synthesis of prevailing views about the quality of play in the early years of the ManDak.
- Today, the phrase "high minors" applies only to Double-A and Triple-A leagues. In the 1950s, it likely was also commonly used to refer to Class A leagues.
- Today, the 1950s "Class A" level would be the equivalent of the "Advanced Class A" level of the California, Carolina, and Florida State Leagues.

Some context:

- There were 34 team-seasons in the ManDak
- All stats shown on next slides are for single seasons
- A few regular <u>pitchers</u> also met the requirements for regular <u>batters</u>
- Therefore, there were 400 total player-seasons that qualified as "regular"
- Average was 11.8 regulars (position players plus pitchers) per team per season


A tad below the 1950s Class A minor leagues

Remember, this calculation does *not* include those players who had no pro experience before or after playing in the ManDak.

The large majority of those players would have been worse than Class A.
