TECUMSEH VS. MORNING STARS.

The match between the above-named clubs, which has caused considerable excitement in base ball circles hereabouts, came off on the Cricket Field yesterday afternoon, in presence of a large and respectable concourse of people. The fact that the Tecumseh men had not had any practice this season led many to believe that their opponents, who head the list of second-class clubs in this city, would have an easy victory over their "Indian brethren;" but the "Lo's," ever ready to rally around their noble "chief," and, "snuffing victory from afar," played with their accustomed steadiness, and came out conquerors by 21 runs. The Stars, however, have reason to be proud of their efforts yesterday, the playing of many of the members being quite equal to that of older and more experienced clubs. The "red-men" had some new players amongst them, and, from lack of practice, did not make as good a show as was anticipated. The batting of Cooper and Harrison was admirable, while the "chief" (Southam), caught "flys" with as much ease, evidently, as a six-year-old boy. He seems to have a "fascination" for every ball that soars in his latitude and yesterday added additional laurels to his already well-known reputation as a ball-tosser. The game was umpired by Mr. J.
