NEW YORK STATE TOURNAMENT.

**"Young Canadians," of Woodstock, vs.
"Atlantics," of Brooklyn.**

NIAGARA FALLS, June 16.

The New York State Base Ball Tournament, gotten up by the Niagara Falls Base Ball Club, and held on their grounds, midway between the Falls and the Suspension Bridge, which has been in progress for a week or so, terminated yesterday afternoon in a grand match between the "Young Canadians," of Woodstock, the champions of Canada, and the noted "Atlantic" Club of Brooklyn, the ex-champions of the United States. Fully 4,000 people were present to see the game, including a large deputation from London, Woodstock, Ingersoll, Paris and Hamilton. The "Young Canadians" being short three men, their places were filled by three members of the "Maple Leaf" Club of this city, two of whom, Young and Sweetman, greatly distinguished themselves, their playing throughout rating first-class. Clyde never pitched better, and Hearn fully sustained his reputation as a first-rate catcher. Douglas took the lead at the bat, having a clear score. Good batting was also displayed by Sweetman, Hearn, Pascoe, Edwards and Young. Considering the very little practice the "Young Canadians" have had, they played very creditably.
