

BASE BALL TOURNAMENT.—The attendance yesterday to witness the game of base ball between the "Atlantics," of Brooklyn, and the "Young Canadians," of Woodstock, was large. Excursion trains were run on the Great Western and N. Y. Central Railroads, and of course each brought their quota of sight seers and interested spectators. The game, from the commencement, was all in favor of the Atlantics and if the rain had not commenced to pour down at the end of their sixth innings, it is quite possible that they would have doubled the score of the so-called champions of Canada.—The 'Atlantics' Club is composed of Messrs. Pearce, Smith, Start, Chapman, Crane, Mills, Ferguson, Pratt and Zettline, and the 'Young Canadians' of Messrs. Douglas, Sweetman, Clyde, Hearn, Atkinson, Pascoe, Jackson, Edwards and Young. At the close of the 5th innings the score stood, Atlantics 30, Young Canadians 17, the former adding six to their score when the rain caused a 'scatteration' and put an end to base ball: The score on each innings was for the Atlantics 7 8 3 6 6 6, and for the Young Canadians 2 11 2 2 0. Of course the silver tea set goes to the Atlantics, but we cannot say that they are extraordinary as players, and certainly fail to impress one to the same degree as the English Eleven: They are said to be professionals, and it is possible they are, but they certainly are not masters of their profession. During the game the press became so heavy that the stand gave way under them, and then there was scrambling and laughing.—In throwing the cricket ball Mr. Helliwell, of this town was third, and second in doing some jumping.
